

High Cube Warehouse



Warehouses Current Status

- •May 2024, both applicants appealed to the Ontario Land Tribunal on the basis they met all the requirements for site plan approval and satisfied the Town's conditions.
- •If the conditions were not satisfied, then the conditions are unreasonable.



What followed

JCRA delegated to Town Council

 The town should oppose the OLT appeal; Town agreed.

JCRA requested Participant status

- At OLT hearing, which was approved despite the applicants' objection to our request.
- Participant status is limited to a written submission.



What followed

- The OLT advised JCRA cannot provide any "expert opinion".
- The OLT delayed the hearing from January until just last week and converted it to a "written hearing".



What followed

- The SPA's were approved on the basis they met all the conditions.
- Agreed to construct buildings in an order that noise mitigation in the form of buildings or temporary noise walls will be in place before buildings are used.



What's Next?

- 1. We will ask the Town to request that noise levels be returned to municipal jurisdiction (from the province) for these sites
- 2. We will ask the Town to install emissions level monitoring between these sites and the residences.



What's Next?

1. We will ask the Town to use the \$250,000 given by the applicants to improve mitigations for the community.

Province Mandate

- Minimum 20,600 People & Jobs
- 103 Ha



Midtown Development

Current Town Proposed Plan

- •29,900 people & Jobs by 2051
- •Up to 56,000 post 2051
- Only 65 Ha are developable
- Height will be determined by FSI and CPPS



Current Status

Spring 2024, the province proposed a Transit Oriented Community (TOC) in Midtown, does not require Town or Region approval.



Current Status

•We Love Oakville, with representatives from a number of RA's, came together to oppose the TOC over concerns about hyper density.



Current Status

 December 2024 - TOC proposal permitted a single developer, Distrikt, to build up to 58 stories for their 11 buildings. This plan does not align with responsible and reasonable growth.



What Followed

•Thank you to residents who sent emails, texts, and attended meetings.

•Town Council unanimously passed the Midtown OPA in February 2025.





What Followed

• "The OPA is the upper limit of what the severely constrained area of Midtown can handle. Yet it is the result of considerable thoughtful evaluation by planners, markets analysts, economists. lawyers, engineers and the public. It is balanced, defensible and with a collaborative approach by all has potential to be vibrant livable neighbourhood.

What's Next

- •The OPA must be approved by the provincial Minister, Housing and Municipal Affairs.
- •The TOC must align with our OPA.
- •The Town's Master Transportation Plan must ensure the right transportation structure is in place.





- Interim: The current Central Branch will continue serving the community until the new facility is open.
- Campaign: Started early 2024 to create opportunities outside the current project scope like roof-top gardens, a living wall, Truth and Reconciliation spaces, etc.












Background-Project Timeline











- A Simple and Functional: Permeability from sidewalk
- B Flexible: Slightly larger square/promenade connection
- C Modest Water Feature: Significantly scale down and flexible for seasonal plantings/displays during the winter months
- Plexible Seating/Steps for Seating:
 Additional seating, mezzanine, benches
- Trees and Greenery
 - 'Instagrammable' Moment: Oak Leaves combined with 'Oakville' identifier for a stronger visual impact
